
Newsletter returns to Norridgewock

Beech Hill Road reconstruction wrapping up

Beech Hill Road saw much needed reconstruction this summer as road surfaces were improved, travel ways widened in some areas, and extended pavement over a section of Beech Hill and Independence Drive. The project also included two large culvert replacements and significant ditching.

Merle L. Lloyd and Sons was awarded the reconstruction contract, while Wellman Paving was responsible for the vast majority of paving and shoulder finish work. Final paving was completed October 18. Wellman crews are completing shoulder work beginning November 1.

The Road Committee is currently reviewing proposed projects for the 2018 construction season, pending funding. There are numerous projects for consideration. Budgets, traffic volume, road condition, and other factors are all taken into account when prioritizing projects. •




Referendum election to be held on November 7



There are four referendum questions. Question 1: York County Casino; Question 2: Medicaid Expansion; Question 3: Transportation Bond; Question 4: Pension Funding Constitutional Amendment. Nov. 7 Referendum Questions

Polling to be held at Mill Stream Gym

Question 1: Do you want to allow a certain company to operate table games and/or slot machines in York County, subject to state and local approval, with part of the profits going to the specific programs described in the initiative?

Question 2: Do you want Maine to expand Medicaid to provide healthcare coverage for qualified adults under age 65 with incomes at or below 138% of the federal poverty level, which in 2017 means \$16,643 for a single person and \$22,412 for a family of two?

Question 3: Do you favor a \$105,000,000 bond issue construction, reconstruction and rehabilitation of highways and bridges and for facilities or equipment related to ports, harbors, transportation, freight passenger railroads, aviation, transit and bicycle and pedestrian trails, to be used to match an estimated \$137,000,000 in federal and other funds, and for the upgrade of municipal culverts at stream crossings? Total estimated life time cost is \$133,875,000 representing \$105,000,000 in principal and \$28,875,000 in interest (assuming interest at 5.0% over 10 years).

Question 4: Do you favor amending the Constitution of Maine to reduce volatility in state pension funding requirements caused by the financial markets by increasing the length of time over which experience losses are amortized from 10 years to 20 years, in line with pension industry standards? ◆
