## Library Trustees Team Up with Chewonki Foundation for Programming Success


#### "Owls of Maine" Program drew approximately 150 attendees

The Norridgewock Board of Library Trustees has worked to create a more frequent and more diverse slate of programming at the libraries. In cooperation with the Chewonki Foundation (Wiscasset, ME), the Trustees welcomed a group of over 150 to the Somerset Grange. The "Owls of Maine" program ran about 90 minutes and was an opportunity for people of all ages to learn more about owls and have the opportunity to see live owls.

The program began with an informal classroom setting; there was a slideshow presentation, taxonomic displays, diagrams, and more. The program also taught students how to recognize different owl calls and what to do in the event they find an owl in the woods.

The highlight of the program was the feature of live owls. Three owls were observed: great horned owl, barred owl, and eastern screech owl. The owls participating in the program are not held captive, but rather are considered non-releasable as a result of injuries that prohibit their ability to survive in the wild.

The Trustees welcome you to visit the library during regular hours to find out more about future programming. Mercer Road Library is open Tuesday and Thursday 10 AM to 6 PM and Saturday 10 AM to 2 PM. Sophie May Library is open Wednesday 10 AM to 2 PM.

## **TIF Committee Explores New Program Options**

Local Facade Program among Those Seriously Considered

The Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Advisory Committee has been working diligently in order to use the TIF revenues in order to improve local economic conditions. The scope of the work is tremendous and the committee is exploring a variety of programs. Past projects have included partial funding of the new fire station, gateway signage throughout the community, and the installation of additional electricity options in the downtown.

TIF Committee members have reviewed facade program guidelines that could potentially be implemented within the TIF District. The fund could ultimately allow for matching grant assistance to local businesses in improving the curb appeal of commercial properties. Projects could include painting, upgrading signage, landscaping, reconstruction, window replacement, among other options. While the program guidelines are still being developed, there stands to be great potential for the community.

It is important to remember that the committee serves in an advisory capacity and the Board of Selectmen provides the approval for projects. The public is encouraged to attend TIF Committee meetings and provide expanded perspectives and fresh ideas for consideration in implementation.

Oosoola Park Boat Launch is also planned for rehabilitation; the project was expected to be completed in October 2018 but was ultimately delayed due to permitting obstacles. At present time, the project is planned to be completed in June 2019. This upgrade will be funded largely through a grant from State of Maine Bureau of Parks and Lands; however, the local share will be mitigated through the use of TIF funding. The committee has also been working to explore upgrading street lighting to LED, which can be more attractive and provide cost savings for the Town. ♦

#### Wastewater Facility Upgrade Moves Forward Project Awarded to New Hampshire Firm, Penta Corporation

The Norridgewock Wastewater Treatment Facility has been the subject of many local conversations over the course of several years. After being cited for violations in 2015, the Boards of Selectmen and Sewer Commissioners joined together to identify a cooperative, long-term plan for operating and maintaining the facility.

In April 2017, the Town secured \$5 million in funding from USDA, which opened the door for a much-needed facility upgrade. The loan/grant combination will help to fund upgrades at the facility, as well as the system's three pump stations (Mechanic St., Perkins St., and Rebecca St.).

The bidding process was completed, resulting in 4 competitive bids. 3 of the bids were within approximately 2.7%, which indicates that the Town likely received fair proposals. Ultimately, the lowest responsive bidder was selected; Penta Corporation of Moultonborough, New Hampshire, has been preliminarily selected. The proposal must ultimately gain approval of relevant State and Federal agencies before the Town can move forward.

The current bidding environment brought bids in above what was expected, so the Town has worked closely with engineering firm Olver Associates to trim project costs and fully leverage funding opportunities available. A series of reductions, combined with contract negotiations have brought the project within financial reach.

Groundbreaking is expected in Spring 2019.
